RABBI'S MESSAGE

Some years ago I had the unforgettable experience travelling to the USA via Air Egypt. Upon arrival in Cairo airport an arrogant border official demanded my passport and onward ticket. Both were unceremoniously dumped into a drawer, and I was informed that I should come back to this same desk half an hour before departure. I was obviously greatly relieved to find later that they had not misplaced the documents. It was only two days after Simchat Torah, but as the airplane began to increase its speed on its way to take-off from Mitzravim words from Pesach Seder immediately came to mind:"In every generation it is man's duty to regard himself as though he personally has come out of Egypt."

Pesach is the Festival of Freedom. Zman Cheruteinu. we when celebrate being released from bondage under the despotic rule of King Pharaoh. Servitude restricts the captives' freedom, preventing them from realising their full potential and from achieving what they really want. As long as the slave is restrained, the yoke of captivity weighs heavily on his shoulders, and he endeavours in every way possible to achieve freedom.

What is true when we speak of enslavement at the hands of a cruel dictator is equally applicable to internal servitude: the Prison of the Mind. Selfimposed restrictions can be crippling and damaging, impeding us from being who we really are (or at least should be). We are limited by inhibitions and fears, most of which are only perceptions and worries.

Think back to all the things would already have accomplished in life, if a small voice inside you had not stopped and said:

"Am I really ready to do this?" "I'm too old / too young / too rich / too poor to..."

"My spouse would never go along with..."

"That. I'll never do!"

This form of subjugation is even more dangerous than physical confinement. When an outsider constricts your liberty, you rebel, resist and do not rest until you have emancipated yourself. But when you have put up the barbed wire and watchtowers inside your own mind, you do not feel at all imprisoned and hence you have no desire whatsoever to liberate vourself.

"In every generation it is man's duty to regard himself as though he personally has come out of Egypt." If you have travelled Air Egypt recently, perhaps you can understand this precept in the geographical sense. Otherwise you might prefer the interpretation of the Sages. They point out that the word Metzarim, which means limitations, is a homonym with Mitzrayim or Egypt. The Festival of Freedom celebrates liberation from all restraints, external and internal.

This Pesach, break free! Smash down the walls and barriers you have built around your own personality and enjoy liberty as you never have before.

I wish you all a Kosher, happy and truly meaningful Festival of Liberation.

WHAT TO DO, AND HOW TO DO IT

Maot Chittim

It is an old and widespread custom to give Tzedakah during the first part of the month of Nissan to enable the less fortunate to celebrate Pesach in an adequate and dignified manner. This is in keeping with the declaration we make at the beginning of the Seder, "all who are hungry, let them come in and eat." Collections are thus taken up by our welfare organisations, and in particular by the Chevra Kadisha, specifically for this purpose. To assist those in need within our community, now is a good time to make a contribution to the Rabbi's Discretionary Fund. This can be sent to the Shul office or deposited directly into ABSA account 38043260534 (Branch code 632005)

♥ Sale of Chametz (Must be completed before Monday 14 April at 8:30 a.m.)

During the eight days of Pesach one may neither eat nor own any Chametz (leavened food). It is not practical to consume or to physically get rid of all Chametz before the onset of Pesach. One may however sell all Chametz to a non-Jewish person - if the sale is valid according to Jewish law then the Chametz is not 'owned' during Pesach.

The technical details of this sale are involved because the goods do not physically change hands. It is highly recommended that you appoint a rabbi as your proxy to sell your Chametz before Pesach. The rabbi will also re-purchase your Chametz from the Gentile at the completion of Pesach

★ Bedikat Chametz (Sunday 13 April in the evening)

This is the traditional search for Chametz (leaven and leavened products), using a candle, wooden spoon and feather. It is customary to hide ten pieces of bread around the house. These are then "found" when the search is performed.

Before starting recite the following Bracha: בָּרוּדְ אַתָּה ה' אֱלֹקֵינוּ בֶּלֶךְ הָעוֹלֶם אַשֶּׁר קִדְּשָׁנוּ בְּמִצְוֹתָיו וְצְנָנוּ עַל בִּיעוּר חָמֵץ

When the search is complete, recite the following formula to annul any Chametz that you have not found (original Aramaic text can be found in the first pages of most Haggadot):

ANY FORM OF LEAVEN THAT IS IN MY POSSESSION WHICH I HAVE NOT SEEN OR HAVE NOT REMOVED, OR HAVE NO KNOWLEDGE OF, SHALL BE NULL AND DISOWNED AS THE DUST OF THE EARTH.

❖ Siyum (Monday 14 April after the morning service)

All male first-born are obligated to fast on the day before Pesach to commemorate the miracle of their salvation from the plague of Death of the First Born. There is one way that this obligation is waived: if the first-born takes part in a festive Mitzvah-meal, such as the meal after a Bris, or after a Siyum (the completion of a tractate of the Talmud). A Siyum will be made in Shul after the morning service.

♥ Burning of Chametz (Monday 14 April before 11:00 a.m.)

Any Chametz found in the course of the previous evening's search and any other leftover Chametz is burnt at this stage. There will be a fire available at the Shul's service entrance (North Avenue side)I for burning of Chametz between 10:30 and 11:00 a.m.

❖ Annulment of Chametz (Monday 14 April before 11:00 a.m.)

The second formula for annulling the Chametz is recited after the Chametz has been burnt (Here again the original Aramaic text can be found in the first pages of most Haggadot.)
